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# Honoring Carlos Parra

Carlos Parra, a beloved member of our community at Broward College and Senior Director of Student Engagement passed away on January 6 at the age of 43. He was the mastermind behind some of the best events and programs that have occurred on campus and the source of many smiles for those who had the pleasure to be around him. No article or book will ever do justice to what he meant for his family and friends. He was the friend people went to for advice, the motivator, the sun on a rainy day, and the person who saw the glass half full.

He saw the glass so half full that he helped establish and was head of the eSports program during the pandemic with Diana Hargis and Miguel Palalcios at Student Life.

This was a good way of keeping everyone connected during distance learning. And connection was something he shared deeply with his colleagues and friends at BC.

Parra liked working with others and cared about working in activities and programs that could enhance the students' experience and increase their engagement, as well as working with those who shared the same belief.

"What I enjoy the most is working with awesome folks at Broward College such as Diana Hargis and Miguel Palacios who care about students and want to make this [eSports program] excel," he shared two years ago to The Observer during an interview.

He brought a lot of passion and energy to his projects, impacting others who he worked with.

"More than he knows. He re-energized my love for student services, and pushed me to be a better Student Services professional," expresses Jared White, Parra's colleague and friend for about the past 10 years.

"He was one of my biggest advocates. Beyond that, personally he was always available to talk about our personal lives, be it relationships, or parenthood, he was always there to give advice and talk."

White worked for more than three years with Parra. During this time, White was Student Life Coordinator and Parra was his director. They worked alongside each other to organize BC's commencement ceremonies during the last few years.

They became close friends and shared many memories. In October last year, White went to Parra's wedding. "You could tell his genuine love for his wife, December, and just overall love for life, and how appreciative he was for his friends and family being there."

Parra began his journey at Broward College as a student, where he became student government president. Diana Hargis worked for Student Life and met Carlos at South Campus during his time in office. Twenty-five years of knowing each other brought many funny and cherished memories.

They shared a friendship and worked side by side throughout their whole careers. "As much as we were work colleagues, we were friends first. He was a constant reminder of positivity, to take time to have fun, and don't hold back on a thing in life - life is too short and enjoy every minute of it."

Parra brought amazing guest-speakers to campus during his time as Director. In the Fall 2022, actor and singer Jonathon Groff visited campus and the school term before Miami Heat Legend NBA player Chris Bosh did as well.

He oversaw graduation and the commencement ceremonies. But, as Hargis points out, his passion project was branding the BC and Seahawk logos.

He also liked working and contributing to the Student Veterans program. He was the glue between the veterans at BC, as he managed to help create a strong bond between everyone during their annual BBQ Mixers at Tigertail Lake and events that brought veterans together.

Cody Cayen, student veteran and BC graduate with an A.A. in Health Sciences, was surprised Parra had not served because he gave this air and genuine loving and compassionate energy that made him fit well with everyone. The way the group clicked with him in a genuine and authentic way made him feel like another veter-

"It was a hat trick for him to bring veterans together, because it is not an easy thing," Cayen said, bringing a whole group that didn't serve in the same unit and not necessarily share the same stories. "Carlos was like a special operator that put everything together to make us all feel welcomed and helped foster that kinship amongst the group every time we got together; it is just a beautiful thing."

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

In her 24th year of teaching, Professor Kelly Walker understands what goes into being a successful teacher. Professor Walker started teaching for Broward County Public Schools at 21 years old after graduating from the University of Miami. She has worked as a general education teacher, special education teacher and a special education coordinator. All her years of experience provide students Broward College's **Teacher Education Program** with a valuable insight into what is needed to be a successful teacher.

When asked how she prepares her students to become successful teachers, Professor walker says her goal is to teach her students to be an advocate for their future students. "My courses focus heavily special education and compliance. I want my students to be knowledgeable of the law (federal and state) so that they can be a voice for their students, as well as help

their students' parents be meaningful participants in their children's education."

Professor Walker also enriches her students' experience with additional activities outside of campus, such as their participation in the Broward ESE Advisory Council. This is a volunteer group that advocates on behalf of students with special needs in Broward County Public Schools. teachers Parents, advocates meet monthly everything discuss regarding Special Education in Broward County Public Schools. Walker believes this council is "a great opportunity for students to network with professionals who are already in the field, as well as hear about some of the challenges special needs families face on a regular basis."

Professor Walker also understands the importance of success outside of college and works to prepare students for life after Broward College. During students' practicum semester, she helps them write a cover letter and create a professional "teaching"

Professor Walker has worked at Broward College since 2010. She started as an Adjunct Professor and within 7 months, transitioned to a full-time professor in the Teacher Education Program. Professor Walker was the 2011 Professor of the Year at South Campus and a recipient of the collegewide Presidential Endowed Teaching Chair in 2016, demonstrating her effective teaching strategies.

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# Students learn from music professionals during Symposium

The Florida State College System Activities Association (FCSAA) held its annual Winter Music Symposium from January 26 to 28 at the State College of Florida campus in Bradenton, Florida.

At this conference, students from the music departments across the 28 colleges in the state that belong to the FCSAA were able to learn from professionals in Master Classes, rehearse, perform, and enjoy live performances.

"It was completely amazing!" shares Alejandro González, music a performance student and drum player who attended the event. "Not only did I make friends, but I was also able to be surrounded by great musicians, great faculty, where every day and every rehearsal was a new way to learn."

Students explored the music hall, classrooms, and the overall SFC campus, many for the first time. At night, Broward College music students went to the beach and collected some seashells, since their hotel

was right by the water.

At the conference, students were divided based on their instrument which belonged to the strings, woodwind, brass, percussion, piano, classical guitar, jazz, or voice categories. A Student Artist competition in these eight categories was also held at the Symposium, having nine winners, since there was a female and male voice competition.

A night show took place to welcome the students from all Florida state colleges during the first night. The Sarasota Opera opened the event, followed by the Sarasota String Quartet. Then Dr. Joseph Holt, a pianist from the Sarasota Orchestra, played for the students followed by a professional Jazz Combo.

Marcela Del Pino, a music major who focuses on voice, said that this concert was her favorite part of the Symposium. She comments that these performances "took over the room leaving everyone in the audience for something to look forward to and accomplish in all of the days we were staying [at Bradenton]," especially because the performances related to the categories and instruments the students

played at the event.

Musicians went activities, like the Master Classes, specific to their instruments, SO three days at the Winter Symposium looked different for everyone attending but everyone attended the main events. In addition, those who were auditioning for the competition or performing had separate activities to rehearse and prepare for the competition, which happened to take place the day they arrived.

Each college is only allowed to select two students, who meet FCSAA's eligibility guidelines, to participate in the Artist Competition. This year, Del Pino auditioned in the Female Voice category of the Artist Competition, representing Broward College.

Since the audition took place the same day of their arrival, this meant that those chosen by their school spent the first day rehearsing for the competition.

Del Pino, in addition to competing, also participated in a choir performance. "It was an amazing experience since we worked with a different choir director and different students from

was a great opportunity for Broward College students to expand their knowledge, have fun, and meet others in the music industry as well as other musicians that will soon join it.

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
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# NFL Free Agency 2022-23 Season Recap

NFL Free Agency officially started last March 16. Also, trades were made official that same day. There was no shortage of important league altering news, starting with two MVP caliber QBs and all pro wide receivers. Some of these moves led to playoff berths, and some led to surprising disappointing seasons.

Since the Packers lost to the 49ers in the Divisional Playoff game, there was contagious uncertainty on what Aaron Rogers would do next season. He had three options, either retire, ask for a trade, or sign a deserving extension, after becoming a back-toback MVP. He waited until March 8 to inform the Packers of his decision, which was coincidently the same day the deadline to franchise tag All-Pro Packers receiver, Davante Adams.

So, on March 8, Rogers announced on twitter that he'll be returning to the Packers. Also, that both sides are working on a new contract that would lower his salary cap figure, while also giving him contractual clarity throughout his 40s. A week later Rogers signed a 3 year \$150.8 million extension, which is basically \$50 million a year, which also made him the highest paid QB at that

time. Some analysts would say Rogers doing this led to Adams departure, but he said he wanted an opportunity to play for the Raiders, with his best friend Derek Carr. Also, the Packers offered him basically the same contract as the Raiders. Both the Packers and Raiders eventually didn't make the playoffs so it could be perceived that the trade didn't necessarily work out.

To bolster their team and especially their defense, the Chargers acquired All-pro defender Khalil Mack from the Bears, for a 2nd a 6th round pick. This trade finally gave the Chargers an opportunity to make the playoffs. Another trade that took place was the Cowboys trading Amari Cooper to the Browns for a 5th and a

6th round pick. The Cowboys still made the playoffs but lost to the 49ers mainly because of more playmakers and depth at the WR position. One of the biggest and most shocking trades this offseason was the Chiefs trading All-pro WR Tyreek Hill to the Dolphins, in exchange for a 2022 1st, 2nd, and 4th round pick, and as well as a 2023 4th and 6th round pick. Even though the Chiefs traded him, they were still able to make the playoffs, with the best record in their conference. Patrick Mahomes had to carry a bigger leadership role, on and off the field; and they were able to land another Super Bowl appearance.

They also signed Hill to a four-year \$120 mil extension.

All together that's five picks, and the Chiefs will assuredly be using most of these picks on WR's, to try and make up for Hill's production. The Dolphins facilitated this trade to give Tua Tagovailoa the best offensive pieces possible and giving him no more excuses to perform at a pro bowl level. If Tua is playing well or gets injured, the Dolphins signed veteran QB Teddy Bridgewater to fill in for him, if any of those things happen. They also signed pro bowler left tackle Terron Armstead to a five-year \$70 million deal. All these moves, especially the Hill sign and trade, finally led the Dolphins to their 1st playoff berth in about six years.

The Dolphins traded WR

Devante Parker and a 2022 5th round pick to their division rival Patriots for a 2023 3rd round pick. The Patriots facilitated this deal because they needed a No.1 WR, and the Dolphins had just traded for Hill. This trade didn't lead to the Patriots making the playoffs because their offensive coordinator situation was constantly influx. That same week the Dolphins signed their all-pro cornerback to a five year extension deal, with \$50.6 million in new money, which also made him have the most guaranteed money by a CB in NFL history, for only about two weeks. Then the Browns signed pro bowl CB, Denzel Ward, to a five-year \$100.5 mil extension to become the highest paid CB in NFL history.

All the free agency moves and in-season acquisitions, definitely led the Chiefs and Eagles to meet in the Super Bowl. Both teams' front offices never hesitated to make their teams better, and to build around their MVP-Caliber OB's. Another thing that facilitated this was their respective team's consistently playing complimentary football, veterans and coaching leadership. The Super Bowl takes place on Sunday Feb. 12, at 6:30 pm, with the Eagles vs Chiefs.

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### The Nets Trade Deadline Acquisitions


The NBA trade deadline is officially Feb. 9 at 3 p.m. During this period before the deadline, the majority of teams are trying to acquire players, to volt themselves into playoff or championship contention. The other teams try to offload unwanted contracts of veterans, to try to acquire as much draft pick capital as possible, to eventually try to rebuild through the draft and/or retool through trade acquisitions, like the Jazz. Over the past couple of trade deadline years, the Nets have been the most active team and have made the biggest acquisitions, like trading for James Harden and Ben Simmons, in consecutive years.

This year is surprisingly not different because on Feb. 5, Adrian Wojnarowski reported that Irving and his agent officially requested a trade. At first when I received the notification from WOJ, I was extremely incensed because their team was championship contenders. Then sources and some NBA analysts reported that Irving and the Nets were in contract extension negotiations, but he didn't l like the "winning a championship" clause, in the third year of their offer. So, when I read and heard that, I understand why he requested a trade. In the NBA, if your current team isn't willing to pay you what you're worth,

then by all means, you have to do whatever is necessary. Also, Irving has never had a massive contract, of his talent and caliber, in his 30s.

The teams that were interested in trading for Irving were: the Mavericks, Lakers, Clippers, Suns, and Heat. Two days after Irving requested a trade, WOJ reported that Irving was being traded to the desperate Mavericks. This officially ended a contentious relationship to say the least, between Irving and the Nets. They traded Irving and Markieff Morris for: Dorian Finney-Smith, Spencer Dinwiddie, an unprotected 2029 1st round pick, as well as a 2027 and 2029 2nd round picks. The picks acquired in this trade, plus the 76ers 2027 1st round pick, will be used to upgrade the roster, around KD. Luka Doncic and coach Jason Kidd, agreed to trade for Irving. On paper, Luka and Kyrie form basically the best backcourt in the NBA. Now that this trade is official. I honestly think both teams got what they were looking for; Mavs finally got a star to pair with Luka, and the Nets were able to get versatile players, who could consistently shoot

After the trade was made official, coach Jacque Vaughn said," My interactions with Kai have always been positive, I want him to succeed. I'll keep it that simple; we've had some ups and downs I guess along the way, and I've also seen him

bring his kids into the locker room." He also said, "I've also seen him grow as an individual, and be a better teammate than when I first met him; he's no longer with us, but I appreciate his time, and I'm looking forward to coaching Spencer and Dorian for sure."

Several of the younger players, like Cam Thomas and Nic Claxton definitely were hurt by the trade, because he was a mentor to them. Thomas said, "That's my guy, we talk about a lot, we talk about Kobe, just life in general. That's probably the main thing I miss about Kai, me having that big brother on the team, just my big brother." Claxton said, "It's been a

whirlwind that I've become all too familiar with, being here for four years, but you can't control it and you just got to keep rolling with it."

After the trade, Irving said," I just know I want to be places where I'm celebrated, and not just tolerated or just kind of dealt with in a way, that doesn't make me feel disrespected. There were times throughout this process when I felt very disrespected, and my talent, I work extremely hard at what I do." He also said, "No one ever talks about my work ethic though. Everyone talks about what I'm doing off the floor; it's just what I'm willing to accept, and I took a chance, luckily

and fortunately, the Dallas Mavericks picked me up."

Now the trade deadline conversation amongst teams moves to how does KD feel out the Irving trade, and does he want to request another trade? KD has been in consistent communication with owner Joe Tsai and Sean Marks on what the franchise's direction is, and how to continue to become a championship contender. The organization said as of right now, they aren't trading KD before the deadline, but there's less that two days left, and anything can happen.

# The Last Of Us is the first live-action adaption of a video game done right

For years, people have always fantasized about turning their favorite video game into a live-action movie or television show. It's understandable; who wouldn't want to see their favorite character in their favorite video game as a real person in a television show or movie? Hollywood understands this as well, as they have tried to capitalize on this market many times. In the early 2000's, Movies like "Doom" (2005) and "Tomb Raider" (2001) came out to critical disdain. Second, it has expanded the universe of "The Last of Us." While the show uses iconic moments and quotes from the game, it has not been afraid to deviate from the source material when necessary to give us more insight into this destroyed world and the people in it. Scientists discussing the virus in episodes 1 and 2 are not in the game, but they are some of the highlights of the show so far.

Lastly, and most importantly, "The Last of Us" respects the source material. Most liveaction adaptations of video games try to change the story in some way to "improve it." Last year's Halo television show is a great example, as the show changed much of the original story from the game. Character's backstories and plot events were changed, which angered fans and caused the show to be scorned by fans and critics alike.

"The Last of Us" understands this and has done the exact opposite. Some things have been changed to fit television better, such as removing spores from the game and replacing them with tendrils, so the characters do not need to cover their faces with gas masks. Some character's fates have even been changed. However, the events and iconic moments from the game are still the same. Seeing Sarah's fate in episode 1 hurt just as much in 2022 as it did when playing the game in 2013. It is clear this show was made with love for fans of the game.

"The Last of Us" is 2023's first must-watch of the year, and hopefully Hollywood learns from this to ensure it is not the last live-action video game adaption done right.
